

## John Kenneth Galbraith

John Kenneth Galbraith shaped the vision of American liberalism more than any other single economist in the second half of the twentieth century.

During the New Deal, he served as a member of President Roosevelt's "brain trust." In 1947, Galbraith joined Eleanor Roosevelt and other leading liberals of the New Deal era to found Americans for Democratic Action.

The Education Fund established the John Kenneth Galbraith Fellowship in Public Policy to continue the Galbraith tradition by building a new generation of liberal leaders.

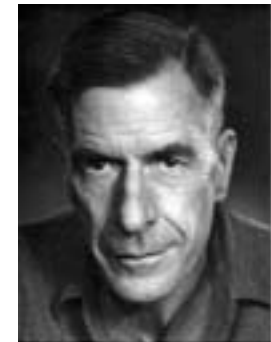
## ADA Education Fund

## Galbraith Fellows

Galbraith Fellows are afforded the opportunity to produce original scholarship on a policy topic of their choosing. Each Fellow undertakes an intensive research project. The culmination of this project is the composition of a formal report including conclusions and policy recommendations. Each report is professionally published by the Americans for Democratic Action Education Fund.

### Topics of recent Galbraith Fellows:

Foreign Relations and War powers of Congress

Felon/ex-felon disenfranchisement

IMF reform and prediction of financial crises

Corporatization of American agriculture/family farms

Fellows are encouraged to become actively engaged in the policy arena as advocates for their specific issues. Past Fellows have met with Congressional leaders on Capitol Hill to discuss policy strategy, written op-eds for national newspapers, and participated in national conferences highlighting their policy focus.

The ADA Education Fund awards Galbraith Fellowships to outstanding college graduates or graduate students. Applicants should have majored in economics, international relations, public policy or a related discipline and have demonstrated an interest in national policy.

Fellows are selected from a national pool of applicants and must demonstrate strong research/writing skills, community service, a commitment to liberal ideals, and plans for future study or a career in public policy.
